Search and Rescue in New Mexico

- SAR missions are conducted by a variety of agencies and teams around the state
- All search and rescue incidents in NM are coordinated by the NM State Police under the Department of Public Safety
- ► NM SAR council
 - Advocate for SAR in NM

 - SAR act
 - SAR plan



Cibola Search and Rescue (CSAR)

- Cibola Search and Rescue is based in Albuquerque, New Mexico
- All-volunteer wilderness search and rescue team that responds to and supports search and rescue incidents throughout New Mexico.
- Established in 1986
- 87 total members
- Age range of early 20s to late 70s
- Approximately 75% male and 25% female
- Day jobs ranging from: Nurse, EMT, health insurance, pharmacy, Sandia national labs, IT, city code enforcement, mortgage officer, retirees



CSAR Mission Statement

The mission of Cibola Search and Rescue is to reduce human suffering and to preserve human life by assisting the New Mexico State Police and other duly designated government agencies in locating and rescuing lost and/or injured persons. As members of this team, we strive to maintain the skills required for the majority of search and rescue missions conducted throughout New Mexico and to perform our duties with competence, professionalism, and respect for the subjects and their families.

What We Do

- Primarily provides ground search and rescue responsibilities
- Additional capabilities:
 - Incident communications
 - Drone searching
 - Wilderness medical capabilities
 - ► 4x4 vehicle support
 - Direction finding

How Does CSAR Get Activated?

- A 911 call is placed (lost person, family member, concerned hiker)
 - Specialty trained State police officer determine if circumstances necessitate SAR response
 - SAR field coordinators notified
 - A certified field coordinator becomes the SAR incident commander (IC).
 - The incident commander activates and manages resources for missions
 - Team members are notified via email and text
 - Individuals who are able to respond mission, contact IC
 - Present to incident base
