## Sandia Mountain Junior Ranger Program

If you hike near the Forest Service Visitor Center at either Sandia Crest or the upper Tram terminal, you probably have seen kids with clipboards hiking around with their parents. This is the sixth summer that the Friends of the Forest and the Forest Service sponsored the Junior Ranger program, an hour-long forest education experience. Kids walk the nearby Nature Trail, read the signs, and answer questions about forest conservation on their work sheets. We award each Junior Ranger a certificate signed by Cliff Dils and a choice of a handsome embroidered patch or a pin-on badge.

Thanks to the friendly folks at the two visitor centers, a total of 5,600 Junior Rangers have earned a patch or badge since we started in 1998. This summer, about 900 new Junior Rangers enjoyed the program. Also, sincere thanks to our sponsor, Sandia Crest House Gift Shop and Restaurant, for their donations which have paid for all the patches and badges awarded at the Crest Visitor Center since we started the program.

## Field Guide To The Sandias

The idea to produce a Field Guide was proposed to the Friends of the Forest and the Forest Service in early 2002 by Don Carnicom. After much discussion during the spring and summer about the form it should take and how it should be published, Mary Stuever developed a proposal dealing with these issues in August, outlining various scenarios for the development and publication of the Guide. This served as a point of departure for the project, and during the fall monthly meetings led by Dick Traeger, volunteers were recruited and assigned, according to their expertise, to write appropriate sections. Costs were obtained for producing and publishing the Guide and after considering the difficulty in raising the amount of money needed (approximately \$90,000), and our lack of publishing expertise, we decided to visit the University of New Mexico Press to look into the possibility of copublishing the book with them. We met with David Holtby, Associate Director and Editor-in-Chief, in late September and found that they were very interested in working with us. In December, a Steering

FY2003 was a good year for the Adopt-A-Trail Program. We added three new groups: D&K Halvorson (Embudito Trail), San Antonito Elementary School (Sulphur Canyon Trail), Boy Scouts - Webelos Pack 460/Den 3 (Three Gun Trail) for a total of 23 groups. A number of organizations are currently considering joining the program. Maintenance activities have been good with a majority of the groups having been out working on their trails, and put in over 829 volunteer man-hours. # **National Trails Day**

This annual event, which was centered at the Elena Gallegos Picnic Ground on June 7, was organized by the New Mexico Volunteers for the Outdoors, Sandia Ranger District, City Open Space Division, and New Mexico Friends of the Forest with Bill Velasquez being the coordinator. The following project descriptions were collected from Friends who participated in NTD.

#### Embudo Horse Bypass Trail Mainte-

nance, Leader: Phyllis Martinez Crew Members: Don Carnicom, Bill Geck, Beth Wright, and eight Sandia Civitans who adopted this trail. Check dams, retaining walls, and steps were constructed. One sign was installed at a trail junction directing hikers to the Embudo Horse Bypass Trail. Two signs were installed at unofficial user trails indicating the route of the official Horse Bypass Trail.

### **Elena Gallegos Picnic Ground**

Gerry Sussman sold raffle tickets to support the Friends/UNM Press project to publish A **Field Guide to the Sandia Mountains**. Anne Hickman handed out information about the Friends at a table with the Adopt-A-Trail display board.

### Pino Trail Reroute and Portal Sign Roof

**Repair**, Leader: Newton Garland Reroute Crew Members: Brian Routhier and Rick Atwell (USFS), Margaret Furman, and about six others. These volunteers constructed a short reroute of the trail from an arroyo bottom to a location north of a huge boulder on a low ridge. The crew pruned branches on several pinyon trees, constructed a trail tread, and placed pruned branches on the old route to discourage use. They hiked up the trail and pruned

### Sat., Oct. 4 Removal of Barbed Wire Fence in Embudito Canyon

This fence lies along the southern boundary of the earlier Elena Gallegos Land Grant and is no longer needed. We will meet at the Embudito Trailhead parking lot at 8:30 a.m. and hike about one-half mile to the work site. Bring gloves, snacks, drinks, and lunch. Wear hiking boots, long pants, and long sleeved shirt. Tools will be provided. Call Sam Beard, 828-0673, if you have questions.

# Emergency Trail Maintenance Crew Activities

This volunteer crew removes fallen trees from hiking and crosscountry ski trails during all seasons of the year. Don Carnicom, Bill Geck, and Ron Hayenga usually go out about once each week to cut trees, install signs, or do other work in the field. They are sometimes joined by Phyllis Martinez, Chris Michel, Sam Beard, Newton Garland or the Lowders and welcome others who would like a day in the outdoors. Since last fall, this group has worked on several of the major trails on the Sandia Ranger District: 10K North and South, Survey, Osha Loop, Tree Spring, Faulty, and others. They also installed an Adopt-A-Trail sign for Hawkwatch International/Intel at the Hawkwatch Trailhead. Lvnn Bender makes these beautiful signs with red-colored wood from junipers cut on the District.

### Embudito Canyon Barbed Wire Fence Removal Project

At the request of Phyllis Martinez, who is rerouting part of the hiking trail in Embudito Canyon, the Friends began removing the old barbed wire fence which was the south boundary of the Elena Gallegos Land Grant. This land is now in the Sandia Mountain Wilderness. While working on the project in April, Sam Beard and Larry King found the official 2.5, 3.0, and 3.5mile markers (Mile Posts) along this boundary. On April 26 Larry, Sam, and Newton Garland removed about 1/8 mile of 4-strand fence between MPs 2.5 and 3.0 and rolled it into "donuts" which will be removed from the wilderness later. The west end of the fence was at MP 3.5 on the eastern boundary of the Glenwood Hills Subdivision just SE of the Embudito parking lot. About one-

Committee was established to provide oversight for the project which included Dick Traeger as Chair, Sam Beard, and Don Carnicom from the Friends of the Forest, and Mary Bean, Dana Howlett, and Mary Voldahl from the Forest Service. Mary Stuever was appointed Editorial Coordinator, and Gerry Sussman was named Project Leader.

It was also decided, at that time, to definitely co-publish with the UNM Press, because our main goal, everyone agreed, was not to make as much money as possible, but to have a high quality and attractive Guide for the general public and for ourselves. We agreed, with UNM Press, to select the specialists to write the various sections and to polish their work to the best of our ability. We also agreed to help fund the very many color illustrations that will appear in the Guide. The Press will carry the bulk of the expense involved in publishing the Field Guide, about \$75,000, and they will do the final editing and designing of the book. They will, with our help, market and sell the Guide.

Our kickoff meeting was held in January, time lines were established, and task force leaders appointed, all with the goal of producing excellence in every aspect and handing the manuscript over to UNM Press in January, 2004, for publication in early spring, 2005. Fund raising efforts started shortly thereafter, and after a slow start, picked up speed and have brought in almost \$30,000. Our expectation is that we may need another \$5,000 to cover all our costs with \$10,000 going towards color illustrations, and \$22,000-\$25,000 for internal editorial and management costs.

One change occurred in mid-summer when Mary Stuever took a full-time position in Arizona. While she will continue to contrib-

quarter mile of the fence east of MP 3.5 was rolled into "donuts" and taken to the trailhead by Sam, Larry, and Stan Upchurch on other days. The Friends plan to remove the remainder of the fence between MPs 2.5 and 3.0 later this fall. Leaders: Sam Beard and Larry King.

#### Spring Tecolote Trail Maintenance

On May 10, Newton Garland, Bill Geck, Margaret Furman, Sam Beard, Sue Mann, and Fred Harrison performed spring maintenance on the Friends adopted trail which begins at Dry Camp Picnic Ground. These volunteers cleaned water bars, applied wood preservative to the AAT sign, and cut brush with loppers and a gasoline-powered brush cutter. The group then enjoyed lunch together in the picnic ground. Leader: Don Carnicom.

#### Spruce-Up Crew Activities

These volunteers paint and may make minor repairs on District structures such as signs and restrooms, and they welcome others who would like this type of informal volunteer work. Manny Chavez and Phyllis Martinez provide the paint and brushes.

Last fall Charles and Marcia Wood and their daughter cut brush and pruned branches in front of the large portal sign at the North Crest Trailhead. Sam Beard and Stan Upchurch later painted this structure with gray wilderness paint.

Two medium-sized brown trailhead signboards have also been painted. Charles and Marcia applied new paint to the map board on the Foothills Trail near the Elena Gallegos pay booth, and Stan and Sam painted the signboard at the Embudito parking lot. The top 6 x 6 on these signs is badly weathered and cracked and would benefit from the installation of a simple roof. Volunteer Ron Phillips and Phyllis Martinez, USFS, designed both steel and wood simple shed-type roofs for recently installed large portal signs. Phyllis plans to let the posts and frame of the steel signs rust naturally to reduce maintenance. Ron and his neighbor, Ralph Meyering, fabricate these roofs at Ron's home and install them on the wood signs with bolts and on the steel sign with welded joints. Felt and wood shingles are nailed to plywood sheeting. These single-pitch roofs have been installed on signs at the following trailheads: lower La Luz, Tunnel Canyon, Otero Canyon, and Mars Court near David Canyon. This shed-type roof is simpler, much more waterproof, and less expensive than the pitched roofs on the existing portal signs and will require much less maintenance.

During the summer, this crew began a project to paint as many trailhead and parking lot information display boards as possible before winter. These boards range in size from one foot square to 4 feet by 8 feet. In the western foothills, a total of seven boards were prepared and painted at the Piedra Lisa South, La Luz, Embudo, and Embudito Trailheads. On the east side, a total of about 19 information boards were painted at the Crest, Ellis, Nine-Mile, Tree Spring, Doc Long, Canyon Estates, Tunnel Canyon, and Otero Canyon parking lots. branches, removed one small leaning tree, relocated a drainage, and replaced a retaining log along the edge of the trail tread. Afterward, they assisted the roofing crew with carrying out leftover materials.

Sign Roof Repair Crew: Newton Garland, Dick Traeger, and two others. This crew removed the weathered shingles, installed felt (tar paper), and nailed shingles on both 2-ft x 10-ft slopes of the pitched roof protecting the large display board and roof structural wooden beams. A galvanized steel ridge cap was installed along the top of the roof to help prevent separation of the two roof sides and to prevent water leaks where the top shingles meet.

# Piedra Lisa Trail Portal Sign Repair and

**Painting**, Leader: Stan Upchurch Crew Members: Sam Beard, Meredith Beard (daughter from N. C.) and Debbie Smith.

These volunteers screwed the roof sheeting of precut chipboard (OSB) and plywood to the roof rafters. The plywood was cut to the correct size with a saw powered by the SRD's new 110-volt gasoline-powered electric generator. Felt was stapled and nailed to the sheeting, and three courses of wood shingles were attached to the roof with ring shank nails to reduce nail movement. The sign was also scraped and wire-brushed in preparation for painting. The underside of the sheeting was painted on Saturday afternoon. A galvanized steel ridge cap was also installed on the ridgeline of this sign. Construction materials were brought to the site on Saturday morning by Chris Michel (USFS) who helped with the Piedra Lisa Trail maintenance.

### **Treasurer's Report**

We began FY2003 on Oct. 1, 2002, with a balance of \$6,600.47 and on Aug. 31, 2003, we had a balance of \$3531.55. Our income for the fiscal year has been \$2195.95 with expenses of \$5264.87.
