### New Name: Friends of the Sandia **Mountains**

This newsletter is the first to be published under our "new name". Our volunteer organization, which is now called Friends of the Sandia Mountains, began originally in 1997 as "New Mexico Friends of the Forest". We retain that name in our official articles of incorporation and adopted Friends of the Sandia Mountains as our "trade name" in October 2004. The Board of Directors determined that the new name more accurately reflects our areas of concentration, the Sandia and Manzanita Mountains, and also our mission, which is to maintain, protect and restore the natural, cultural and scenic resources of these areas for the enjoyment and use of present and future generations. It was also suggested that the new name would further differentiate our group and its purpose from other more controversial, political activist groups with similar names.

### Publication of the Field Guide to the Sandia Mountains By the Friends of the Sandia **Mountains and UNM Press**

Don Carnicom first suggested the idea of the Friends developing a field guide to the Sandias for Sandia Ranger District volunteers and the general public in 2002. The idea was approved by the Friends of the. Sandia Mountains Board of Directors, and a Steering Committee was selected to move forward with the project. After some discussion, it was decided to approach UNMPress to see if they were interested in our project. They were, and they proposed terms that we agreed with - and made it clear that if we wanted all the color that we proposed, we would need to get funding to assist them in this effort. Mary Stuever was appointed Editorial Co-coordinator and Gerry Sussman was named Project Manager. Time lines were established which set dates that had to be met to keep the Guide on schedule. The Friends worked with the SRD staff to select the various subjects to be included in the guide, and sections were assigned to

When Mary accepted a position with the White Mountain Apache Tribe in Arizona, Bob Julyan took over the day-to-day editorial responsibilities. As each chapter was completed, the Editorial Committee of FOSM members and three SRD staff reviewed it and sent it to an outside expert for a second review before handing the manuscript over to the Press. During this time, the Fund Raising Committee was successful in raising enough money to produce a high quality Guide with 124 color plates that had been envisioned.

The official publication date is May 6, 2005. At this point, approximately four weeks after copies of the Guide arrived at

the Press warehouse, sales are approaching 1,000 copies. The early efforts of the Press Sales and Publicity Staff and wonderful work by our volunteers have produced excellent results. Sales at meetings of the N. M. Cross Country Ski Club, New Mexico Mountain Club, and other similar organizations have been very successful. We gave 56 copies to the Albuquerque Public Schools for use in their science curriculum. Major publicity is expected in the near future, including a feature article in the Albuquerque Journal and the start of a fourpart series of lectures by Field Guide authors at the New Mexico Museum of Natural History.

The Guide may be purchased at all major bookstores and other places, as well. It is also available at the Crest House, REI, and the Sandia Ranger Station. For sales opportunities that volunteers have, Don Carnicom, Bob Julyan and Gerry Sussman stock copies or will order them at your request. When we sell copies at meetings or to friends, the FOSM makes \$8.00 per copy. because we buy books at a 40% discount. The difference between the \$19.95 list price (we sell at \$20.00) and FOSM's approximate \$12.00 buying price is always turned over to FOSM. We are not allowed to sell for less than the list price. The original Friends of the Sandia Mountains account has a balance \$4,312.52 and the Field Guide to the Sandia Mountains account has a balance of \$86.12. The Guide has now been published and all bills relating to the Guide have been paid. The remaining balance of \$86.12 will be transferred to the original Friends account and the Guide account closed. Royalties for books sold in regular book stores will start coming into our account later this year; however proceeds from books sold by our members and friends are reflected in our account immediately with over \$1000 being deposited in the last three weeks.
